

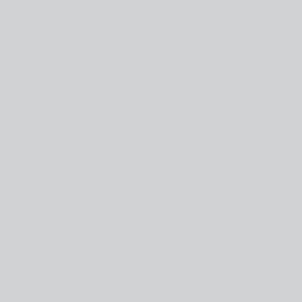

### Adventure “archaeology” at the Archaeological Museum, situated in the Carmelite Church!



Archaeological findings are fascinating reminders of bygone times. Our collections, which concentrate on prehistory and the Middle Ages, the nearby Roman town NIDA and the historic city excavations, offer visitors ample opportunity to discuss in depth the early history of Frankfurt. Precious vases from our Antiquity collection as well as bronze and ceramic pieces from our Ancient Orient exhibition further expand our gallery talks. Vision- and hearing-impaired visitors will find our programmes equally suitable in meeting their special requirements.



The workshops and guided tours for children and young people focus on the theme “Experimental Archaeology – Experimental Learning”. “Indigo”, our popular children’s studio, introduces participants to a variety of arts and crafts techniques. We also offer excursions to the Archaeological Garden, the pottery kilns of the ancient Roman town NIDA and the Celtic burial mounds in Frankfurt’s city forest.

### The Bible Experience!

The House of Bible was originally conceived on the principles of adventure pedagogics. The exhibits are presented through stories and dialog. Visitors are given the chance to experience life in a bygone era, dressing up as nomads or monks, grinding grains, preparing ointments, setting sails, writing in the scriptorium, printing with a Gutenberg printing press, creating Christian fish symbols with a special punch press, playing music on replicas of historical instruments or making use of our special bible software.



The historical significance and modern influence of the bible is explained with much attention to detail, enabling visitors to absorb and apply their newly gained knowledge. Information is conveyed via a variety of conventional and technical means. Ten readers and most of the software may be purchased and used for further instruction.

### Germany's renowned House of Film!

Young and youthful visitors will enjoy acquainting themselves with the wonder of moving-picture technology, the art of story-telling and the secrets of bringing cinematic productions to the screen. One of the main objectives of the museum's educational activities is to make the medium of film more tangible and comprehensible. Several times a week, children's groups are given the opportunity to produce real or animated films. This do-it-yourself process gives children some idea of how much time and effort it takes to produce the "reel" thing. Best of all, they are guaranteed to remember this exciting experience for many years to come, taking home their films as a constant reminder of their time in the producer's chair.

Additional holiday programmes focus on image design (e.g., photography with a pinhole camera) and the creation of stories ("From script to finished product") with the help of moving pictures. The offer range is rounded off with regular showings of children's films in the museum's in-house movie theatre. And finally, during September, there's the children's film festival "LUCAS", which presents the latest children's films from around the world.

### Frankfurt's most-time honoured landmark

Preschool and primary school pupils in particular will enjoy our guided tour of the magnificent Frankfurt Cathedral. If you're interested in finding out more about the history of Frankfurt, then the cathedral and its in-house museum are the place to be. Our historical narrative begins with the story of a mediaeval maiden and her final resting place underneath the cathedral. What is it about the tomb of this former Frankfurt princess and why was the cathedral built directly above it? Why is the skull of St. Bartholomew kept in the cathedral? And exactly why were Roman kings and emperors crowned here?

The answers to these and many other questions are presented during the tour of the museum and the cathedral, one of Frankfurt's most beautiful structures. Our guided tours were conceived with children in mind, helping them to understand the historical significance of this architectural work of art. And with our children's cathedral guidebook, youngsters over the age of ten have an excellent reference book to turn to at their leisure. Teachers, parents and grandparents will find this guidebook an excellent companion for their tour through the cathedral.

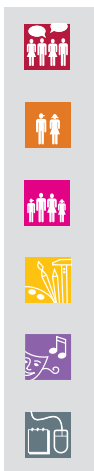

### Eye-witness accounts

With its new exhibition, entitled “The Library of the Old”, the Historical Museum presents a unique project – an idea of the artist Sigrid Sigurdson – that combines the past with the future. Participants of this public archive project represent all age groups and social classes. Their accounts of Frankfurt history are combined to form a biographical, historical and scientific retrospective of the present and previous century. Their tapes, books and notes are filled with historical and biographical contemplations as well as diaries, letters, drawings, official transcripts, scientific journals, photographs, sound-carriers and film material.

At present, the “Library of the Old” features over 60 works. By 2105, this number will have increased to 150! Surely the most fascinating aspect of this network of memories is having the opportunity to speak to the authors in person, a dialog that we are happy to arrange.

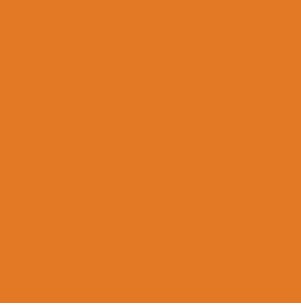

The Intercultural Studio's special range of programmes provides children and youths as well as grown-ups with a diversity of sensual experiences. Craftwork, music, food and everyday items from many cultures of the world are presented. Most of the objects of the museum's educational collection are there to be touched, some may even be put to use. How does a calabash, which musical instruments in Africa are made of, feel to the touch and what does it sound like? For what particular purpose do native American women use the sharp quills of the porcupine? And what do Sri Lankan children play with?

It is said that humans remember half of what they see and hear simultaneously. What remains in one's memory is that which they truly enjoy, like preparing Indonesian delicacies, crafting Peruvian pottery, determining the flavour of an oriental dish, having a go at African drums, revealing the secrets behind mysterious masks and sculptures and then designing your own, meeting children and youths from other countries and continents. 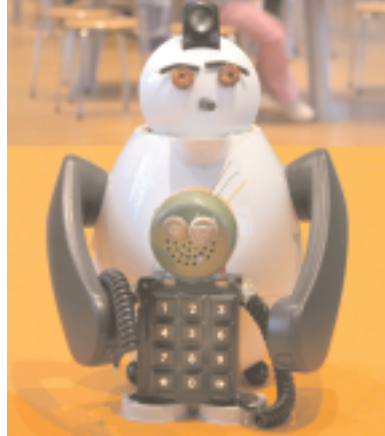


### Following the trail of a true hero – The Oskar and Emilie Schindler Centre of Learning

During World War II, Oskar Schindler and his wife Emilie saved over 1,100 people from certain death while risking their own. At the Oskar and Emilie Schindler Centre of Learning, school classes and youth groups are urged to familiarise themselves with the Schindlers and their invaluable contribution to history. Video interviews with survivors of “Schindler’s List”, a special exhibition and various thematic workshops help convey the significance of the Schindler’s actions.

The tours and workshops offered by Museum Judengasse provide insightful information for complementing your school’s history, religion, politics, German and ethics classes. The archaeological remnants of Frankfurt’s former Jewish ghetto tell the amazing story of Frankfurt’s Jewish citizenry from the Middle Ages to the 20th century. The nearby Jewish cemetery and Börneplatz Memorial provide two further aspects of Jewish history in Frankfurt am Main.

### Please touch!



Founded in 1999, the Museum of Communication is as popular as ever! Our children's workshop has become famous throughout all of Germany. It enables children aged six and older to playfully experience and understand various aspects of communication through direct participation. Computers are on hand, enabling children to "chat", design images or try out Morse code. After becoming acquainted with the international code of signals, they can fax letters or dispatch messages via a letter shoot. Then, at the printer's shop, they have the opportunity to create small postcard-sized pictures.



Nearby, a high desk and goose quill seeks out future poets and authors while two special craftwork tables invite visitors to tinker away merrily. Last but not least, there's the popular "inventor's corner", replete with old telephone components and electronic parts, encouraging children to piece together unusual and imaginative objects and sculptures.

Our cultural education courses, specially conceived to satisfy the interests of art enthusiasts of every age, are a key component of our museum's educational programme. Each of our changing exhibitions is supported by a variety of events, offering in-depth analysis and a platform for open discussion. Guided tours take place every Sunday and Wednesday, with qualified art historians providing insight into the exhibition themes. Public lectures are held on Tuesdays or Thursdays. Here, speakers focus on specific topics concerning art and art history and their relation to the current exhibition. Lecture events are concluded with group discussions of the subject matter.

We also organise special courses in co-operation with various adult education centres from Frankfurt and the Rhine-Main region. These courses, generally spanning three evenings and focussing on current exhibitions, are held in the museum's exhibition hall. Some of the courses also include theme-oriented practical work.

On the first Sunday of every month, Schirn Kunsthalle offers children between the ages of four and seven a playful and interesting tour of the museum, accompanied by MAX and LISA, our two popular hand puppets. On all other Sundays, our tour guides present history, fairy-tales and songs focussing on the exhibitions. 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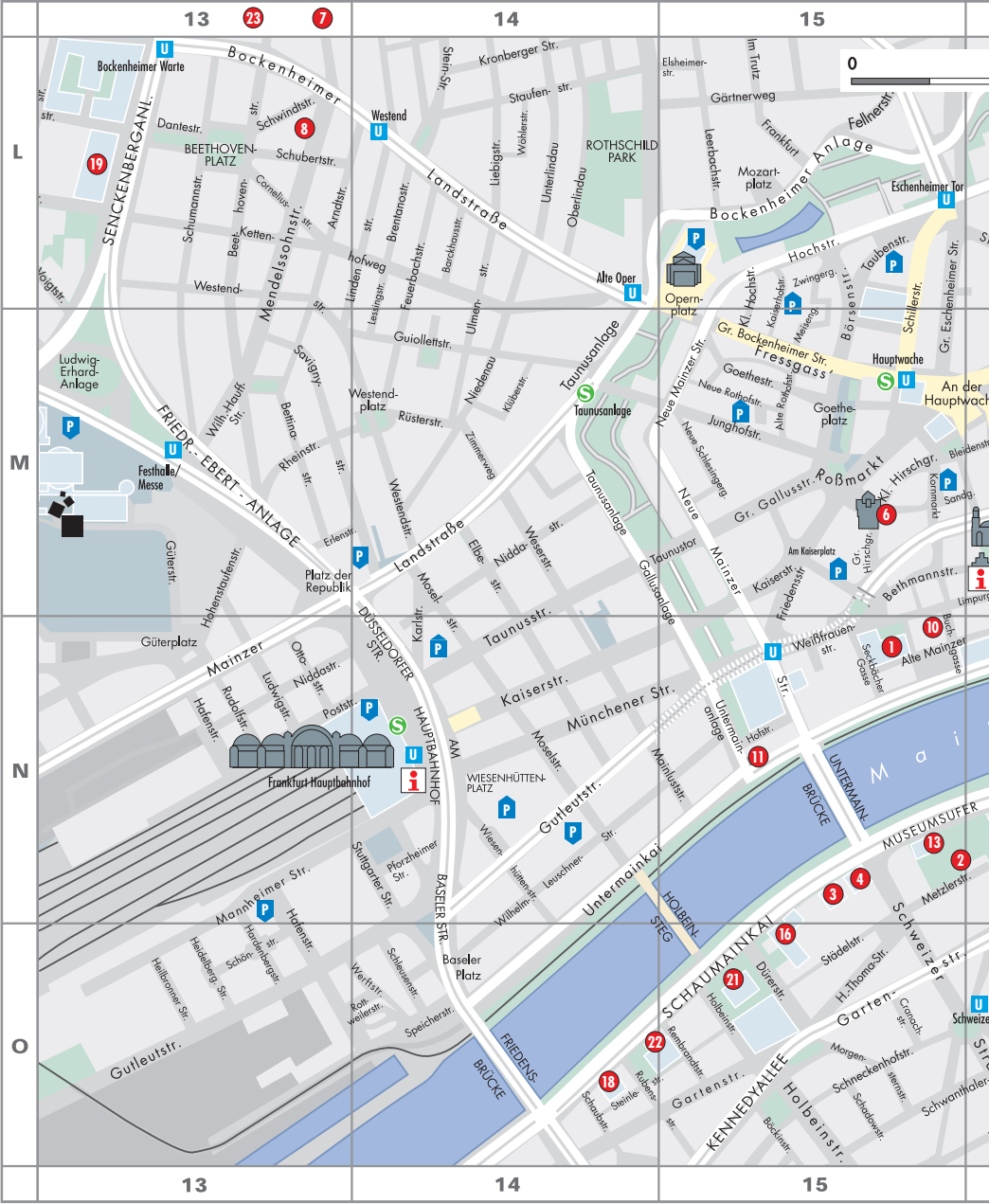
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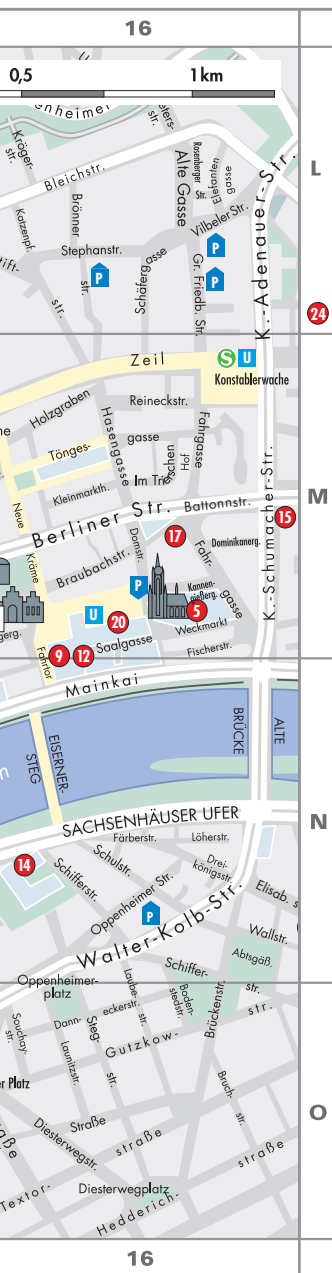


### The Jungle Book and its animals
